

nd the Three Tuns. Wightmans is one the oldest department stores in the UK, and is still in family-owned hands. The Corn Cross stood where the Black Dog weathervane is now, until 1810. It was where cereal crops were traded and th Lords of the Manor held their courts.

Street is home to the Fisher Theatre, which was opened in 1828. On the opposite side is the Bungay Museum and Council offices and further down that side The Green Dragon. Turn back from the pub and pass through Cork Bricks (next to the Council offices) a charming alleyway, to enter the North side of Earsham Street.

Construm Struct Lots of independent shops here. Walk to the end and cross to see Scott House, next to Cock Bridge and a terrace of fine 17th century cottages. Walk back to the 17th Century Castle Inn and pass through the yard to find the footpath to Bungay Castle.

inger, easily a first of this w and Visitor sentre – This was is a motte and bailey castle after orman Conquest and was held by god family, the Earls of Norfolk, er two hundred years. The castle abuilt with a stone keep and was rebuilt with a stone keep and defences in the late 12th century, which provided the famous twin towers of the gate house which remain today. Access to the castle is through the cafe, where you can also find a model of medieva Bungay. On leaving the cafe turn right and follow the lane to Castle Hills,

Castle Fills These are medieval earth works associated with the Outer Bailey of the castle. Climb up to the bench at the top to see some fine views across th Waveney valley. On leaving continue along Priory Lane to St. Mary's Street

Upper Olland Street At the junction of Upper and Lower Olland Streets is one of the oldest buildings in Bungay, now a motor accessory shop. Look up to see a charming window with a medieval sill and Victorian Gothic window. rther along is Emmanuel Church, a ngregational Chapel dating from Congregational Chapel dating from 1518. Turn back and cross the road, passing through Turnstile Lane and over the road to Dinky's Garden for a little rest before turning right and back into the centre of town along St. Mary's Street

At. Many's Great On the Eastern side you will find St. Edmunds Roman Catholic church, in all its Victorian Goth glory, next to St. Mary's. Opposite you can see the fine carved sills of the old Merchants House (c.1500AD) which illustrate the Slaughter of the Philistines by Samson, a man wrestling with two dragons, and three shields supported by mermaids. There are many medieva buildings to see, now with Georgian or mock Tudor facades, including the Fleece, an old coaching inn.

huitoraroon The Buttercross was an ancient trading place and was rebuilt after the Great Fire in the 1680s. It still hosts a market each Thursday. Look up at the Statue of Justice – unusually it is not blindfolded – and then try to find the ancient hand-irons on one of the pillars. The Butter Cross was also once used as

down some steps on Boroun You will go down some steps on Borough Well Lane where you can peek through the railings to see the well that used to bring water to Bungay from Outney Common.

idge Street This was a busy mmercial area in Victorian times th numerous shops and pubs, now pretty residential street. Look out the plaque at no. 34 (the Music puse) which records where the Frenc istocrat Chateaubriand stayed after leeing the French Revolution in 1795.

Palcon Mondow Riverside Walk Cross the Waveney at the end of Bridge Stree and turn right through a kissing gate onto the water meadows where you car see St. Mary's and Holy Trinity churches picturesquely framed across the water.

Bungary Waither Follow the path to the Staithe, the main river trading industria area in Bungay until navigation ceased in 1934. Pass by the Mill House, now a private residence, into Staithe Road. Turn right and walk by the Eliza Dreyer almshouses, built in 1848. As the road



ower predates the Castle and is <u>the</u> oldest complete structure in Bungay. Look for the herrinabone flint work i Look for the herringbone film work in the tower. See the brass plate on the dear which commemorates the church escape from the Great Fire of Bungay n 1688

A left turn through St. Mary's Churchyard passes the ruins of the Benedictine Priory founded by Countess Gundreda, wife of Hugh Bigod, first Earl of Norfolk, in the late 1100s. St. Mary's Church, with its prominent tower, dominates the local landscape. The Church dates from the 12th century. It was damaged in the Great Fire of 1688 and you can see the plaque commemorating the fire outside the baker's shop on Market Place.

Bungay is famous for the legend of the Black Dog, the hellhound that terrorise St. Mary's congregation during a viole St. Mary's congregation during a viol-storm in 1577. Look out for images of Black Dog which can be seen all arou Bungay. Look too at the huge lump of granite rock just in front of the church. Is it a Druid's stone – or a glacial erra
